2. Overview of County

Gilliam County is the 3rd smallest county in size and population within the State of Oregon located on the Columbia Basin plateau in north central Oregon. In 2022 the Oregon Blue Book listed the population at 2,039, in a 1,223 sq mi area. The Columbia River runs along the northern border of the County, next to Interstate 84. The John Day River is the western border between Sherman and Gilliam Counties. State Highway 206 traverses through Condon in an east-west direction from the Morrow County border to the Sherman County border. State Highway 19 runs through Gilliam County in a north-south direction from Interstate 84 to the Wheeler County border. State Highway 74 runs in a north-south direction from Interstate 84 south to the Morrow County border.

Gilliam County has three incorporated cities, Arlington in the northern part (640 est. population), Condon in the southern part (720 est. population) and Lonerock 20 miles east of Condon bordering Morrow County (25 est. population). Condon's elevation is 2,844 feet at state licensed airport facility, Arlington's elevation is 285 feet, providing varied weather and climates between the two cities. The Blue Mountain range ends at the south end of the county near Mayville. Hunting, fishing, and tourism are important secondary industries.

Waste Management is currently the largest employer in Gilliam County, however, the base economy is agricultural products, grain, and livestock. A large area of agricultural and range land is now covered by wind turbines and more recently a solar farm located on Shutler Flat.

The Gilliam County ASA Plan has two ambulance service areas, a northern area (Arlington), served by North Gilliam Medic, a division of the North Gilliam County Health District, and a southern area (Condon), served by South Gilliam County Ambulance Service, a division of the South Gilliam County Health District.

It should be noted that the entire geographical area of Gilliam County can be characterized as "Rural" or (primarily) "Frontier" under the guidelines of the State Trauma Plan (ORS 431.607).

This ASA Plan was developed by Gilliam County to comply with ORS 682.205. Gilliam County recognizes the delivery of prehospital emergency medical care to its residents is dependent on the continuation of the existing nonprofit volunteer ambulance services in the county.

Although it is currently unrealistic to anticipate competition for the right to provide ambulance service to the residents and visitors to Gilliam County, there is a need for a sound assignment process should a provider go under or fail to function and meet established minimum standards. This ASA Plan is designed to establish minimum standards and provide the framework for ongoing system development for prehospital EMS in Gilliam County.

3. DEFINITIONS

- (1) "Address and consider" has the meaning given these terms by ORS 823.180 (2) (3).
- (2) "Advanced Emergency Medical Technician (AEMT or Advanced EMT)" means a person who is licensed by the Division as an Advanced Emergency Medical Technician.
- (3) "Advanced Life Support (ALS) Units" means those units staffed by an Oregon-licensed EMT-Paramedic defined in OAR 333-255-0072 or by a "Physician Assistant licensed under ORS 677.505-ORS 677.525".

(4) "Ambulance" has the meaning given by OAR 333-250-0010(2).

(5) "Ambulance Services" has the meaning given by OAR 333-265-0000(1).

(6) "Ambulance Service Area (ASA)" means a geographic area which is served by one ambulance service provider, and may include all or a portion of a county, or all or portions of two or more contiguous counties.

(7) "Ambulance service plan" means a written document, which outlines a process for establishing a county emergency medical services system. A plan addresses the need for and coordination of ambulance services by establishing ambulance service areas for these rules. Approval of a plan will not depend upon whether it maintains an existing system of providers or changes the system. For example, a plan may substitute franchising for an open-market system.

(8) "Basic Life Support (BLS) Units" means those units staffed by an Oregon-licensed EMT defined in OAR 333-255-0070.

(9) "Communication System" means two-way radio communications between ambulances, dispatchers, hospitals, and other agencies as needed. A two-channel multi-frequency capacity is minimally required.

(10) "Department" means Oregon Health Authority, Emergency Medical Services and Trauma Systems Section (Department)

(11) "Effective provision of ambulance services" means ambulance services provided in compliance with the county ambulance service plan provisions for boundaries, coordination and system elements.

(12) "Efficient provision of ambulance services" means effective ambulance services provided in compliance with the county ambulance service plan provisions for provider selection.

(13) "Emergency" means any non-hospital occurrence or situation involving illness, injury or disability requiring immediate medical or mental health services, wherein delay in provision of such services is likely to aggravate the condition and endanger personal health or safety.

(14) "Emergency Medical Responder" has the same meaning as "First Responder" in ORS 682.025.

(15) "Emergency Medical Service (EMS)" means those prehospital functions and services whose purpose is to prepare for and respond to medical emergencies, including rescue and ambulance services, patient care, communications and evaluation.

(16) "Emergency Medical Technician (EMT)" means a person licensed by the Division as defined in OAR 333-265-0000(15).

(17) "Emergency Medical Technician Intermediate (EMT I)" means a person licensed by the Division as defined in OAR 333-265-0000(16).

(18) "Paramedic (PM)" means a person licensed by the Division as defined in OAR 333-265-0000(17).

(19) "Health Officer" means the County Health Officer.

(20) "Intermediate Life Support (ILS) Units" means those units staffed by an Oregon-licensed EMT-Intermediate defined in OAR 333-255-0071.

(21) "License" means the document issued by the Division to the owner of an ambulance when the vehicle is found to be in compliance with ORS 682 and OAR 333-255.

(22) "Notification time" means the length of time between the initial receipt of the request for emergency medical service by either a provider or an emergency dispatch center ("9-1-1"), and the notification of all responding emergency medical service personnel.

(23) "Owner" means the person having all the incidents of ownership in a vehicle or, where the incidents of ownership are in different persons, the person, other than a security interest holder or lesser, entitled to the possession of a vehicle under security agreement of a lease for a term of ten (10) or more successive days.

(24) "Patient" means an ill, injured, or disabled person who may be transported in an ambulance.

(25) "Provider" means any public, private or volunteer entity providing EMS.

(26) "Provider selection process" means the process established by the county for selecting an ambulance service provider or providers.

(27) "Response time" means the length of time between the notification of each provider and the arrival of each provider's emergency medical service unit(s) at the incident scene.

(28) "Supervising Physician" has the meaning provided in OAR 847-035-0001(12).

(29) "System Response Time" means the elapsed time from when the Public Service Answering Point (PSAP) receives the call until the arrival of the appropriate provider unit(s) on the scene.

4. Boundaries

(1) ASA Map With North and South Boundaries - See Map Attachment #1

(2) ASA Narrative Description

a) ASA #1 Arlington:

The northern (Arlington) ASA encompasses all territory to the northern boundary of Gilliam County, south to Milepost 20 on State Highway 19, and to the western boundary of Gilliam County (the John Day River). The ASA extends to the eastern boundary of Gilliam County.

b) ASA #2 Condon:
The southern (Condon) ASA encompasses all territory with the boundaries of the South Gilliam County Health District (i.e. east, west and south boundaries of Gilliam County and north to the intersection of Mikkalo Lane and State Highway 19) and continues north to approximately Milepost 20 on State Highway 19. The ASA also extends into Wheeler County approximately three miles south of the county line along Pine Ridge County Road, and along Lonerock County Road to locations accessible on Lonerock Creek and Brown Creek.

(4) Alternatives Considered to Reduce Response Times

a) Cooperation/coordination to assure timely and appropriate response
Methods of cooperation and coordination to ensure timely and appropriate responses are thoroughly described throughout this plan. See Map Attachment #5

b) Artificial and geographical barriers to response times
The principal potential artificial barrier to response times throughout Gilliam County is the fact that all EMS personnel are volunteers, and as such are subject to other employment obligations and non-EMS activities. Recruitment and retention continues to be challenging. Consequently, response times can potentially be delayed through the process of locating available personnel.

A second potential artificial barrier is the limited number of ambulances and personnel in the county. If existing ambulances in a given ASA are already responding to an incident, response times to subsequent incidents may be delayed while mutual aid is summoned and responds from a more distant location.

Gilliam County recognizes that both of the potential barriers described above have to be accepted under present conditions. The personal activities of the volunteer EMT's have to be delicately balanced against their continued willingness to participate in EMS activities (to prevent what is termed "burnout").

c) Additional alternatives for reducing response times
In addition to mutual aid, the county uses the nearest available first responders to provide care while the ambulance is enroute to the scene. First responders include the Fire Departments, the Sheriff's Office and ambulance personnel that may be in closer proximity to the scene.

5. SYSTEM ELEMENTS

(1) 9-1-1 Dispatched Calls
Gilliam County is served by one 9-1-1 PSAP, located in Condon, Oregon. Calls are then dispatched via pagers, portable radios and/or other devices.

- (2) Pre-arranged Non-emergency Transfers and Inter-facility Transfers
Pre-arranged non-emergency transfers and inter-facility transfers are rare in Gilliam County. Should a request be made, Gilliam County ambulance services retain the right of first refusal. In the event Gilliam County ambulance services are unavailable, the requesting hospital or facility are responsible to find transportation for the patient.
- (3) Paramedic Intercept Calls
Paramedic will respond if requested and available.
- (4) Response Times
- a) Call received to notification time, 4 minutes or less for 90% of the calls.
 - b) Enroute Time 0700 - 1800 = 15 minutes
or Best Effort 1800 - 0700 = 20 minutes
 - c) Patients will receive prehospital care within the following parameters approximately 90% of the time. This allows for the possibility of severe inclement conditions which could cause unforeseeable delays.
System Response Time shall be as follows for 90% of the calls:
Rural - 45 min.; and Frontier - 4 hours and 30 min.
- (5) Level of Care
South Gilliam County Ambulance provides 24/7 service. ALS service is provided the majority of the time with BLS available but provided infrequently.

North Gilliam Medic is ALS 24/7.
- (6) Personnel
Most ambulance personnel are volunteers, on call. Each shall be appropriately licensed and on file at the State EMS office.
- (7) Medical Supervision
- a) Physician supervisor provides quality assurance through case review feedback to the agencies. Prospective supervision is through training and situational testing based on the county wide protocols developed and reviewed by the Physician Supervisor and the training officer for each prehospital care provider in the county. Online supervision is through medical resource hospital (MRH) Mid-Columbia Medical Center.
 - b) Must ensure that each EMS agency utilizing EMTs in the county is supervised by a physician licensed by the State of Oregon and who is registered and in good standing with the Oregon Medical Board (OMB) as a Medical Doctor (MD) or Doctor of Osteopathic (DO) Medicine.
- (8) Patient Care Equipment
Patient care equipment meets or exceeds minimum standards established by state statutes and administrative rules for BLS, ILS and ALS, as appropriate.
- (9) Vehicles
Ambulances shall meet the standards set by state statutes and administrative rules and shall be on file at the State EMS office.

(10) Training
All providers in the county shall maintain continuing medical education and licensure standards as identified by the Oregon Health Authority, Emergency Medical Services and Trauma Systems Section. Initial training and continued training for ambulance personnel meets Administrative Rules 333-265-0040 through 333-265-0110.

(11) Quality Assurance
Quality assurance in Gilliam County is accomplished through case review, peer review and periodic review by the physician supervisor and/or ambulance governing body.

Ultimately, the appropriate state regulatory agency determines the appropriateness of EMS care given.

a) Structure

The Gilliam County Court shall appoint a Gilliam County Ambulance Service Area Advisory Committee composed of people from the list below:

- North Gilliam County Health District
- South Gilliam County Health District
- Arlington Ambulance
- South Gilliam County Ambulance
- Gilliam County Sheriff's Office
- Frontier Regional Dispatch
- Public Member
- Gilliam County Emergency Management (non-voting)

The principle function of the Advisory Committee shall be to monitor the EMS system within Gilliam County.

b) Process

The Gilliam County Court, in order to ensure the delivery of the most efficient and effective prehospital emergency care possible with the available resources, has directed that the ASA Advisory Committee be established.

Quality assurance in Gilliam County shall be accomplished through frequent case review, peer review, and periodic review by the medical directors and/or ambulance governing bodies (see respective Provider Profiles for definitions of governing bodies). Complaints regarding violation of this ASA Plan shall first be submitted in writing to the Coordinator or Operations Officer of the service involved. If it cannot be satisfactorily resolved at that level, it may then be brought to the Gilliam County Court who shall forward it to the appointed ASA Committee. The ASA Committee shall then review the matter and make recommendations or changes on such complaints or questions to the Gilliam County Court. The Gilliam

County Court shall also resolve any problems involving system operations (changing policies and procedures to address recurring problems, etc.). Ongoing input may be provided by consumers, providers or the medical community to any individual on the Gilliam County Court or members of the ASA Committee. This individual, in turn, will present the complaint, concern, idea or suggestion (in writing) to the full Gilliam County Court for consideration.

c) Problem Resolution

Problems involving protocol deviation by EMS personnel shall be referred to the respective medical director. Problems involving a non-compliant ambulance service shall be presented to the Gilliam County Court for possible review by the ASA Committee. The Gilliam County Court may seek background data and recommendations from the ASA Committee in such instances. However, any member of the ASA Committee who may have a conflict of interest in the matter shall declare such conflict and refrain from participating in any recommendations made.

d) Sanctions for Non-Compliant Personnel or Ambulance Service

Suspension or revocation assignment. Upon a recommendation by the ASA Committee, or upon its own motion, the Gilliam County Court may suspend or revoke the assignment of an ASA upon a finding that the provider has

1. willfully violated provisions of an ordinance, the Gilliam County ASA Plan or provisions of State or Federal law and regulations; or
2. materially misrepresented facts or information given in the application for assignment of an ASA or as part of the review of the performance of the service furnished by the provider.

In lieu of the suspension or revocation of the assignment of an ASA, the Gilliam County Court may order that the violation be corrected and make the suspension or revocation contingent upon compliance with the order, within the period of time stated. Notice of the Gilliam County Court's action shall be provided to the holder of the assignment, which shall specify the violation, the action necessary to correct the violation and the date by which the action must be taken. If the holder of the assignment fails to take corrective action within the time required, the Gilliam County Court shall notify the holder that the assignment is suspended or revoked upon receipt of the notice.

A person receiving a notice of the assignment, denial, suspension, revocation or contingent suspension or revocation of an ASA may request a hearing before the Gilliam County Court by filing with the Gilliam County Court a written request for a hearing within fourteen (14) days of the decision, setting forth the reasons for the hearing and the issues proposed to be reviewed. The filing of a hearing request shall stay the action, pending the hearing and final determination of the decision, unless a change is required due to an immediate hazard to the public safety. The Gilliam County Court shall set a time and place for the hearing. Within fourteen (14) days after the conclusion of the hearing, the Gilliam County Court shall affirm, reverse or modify its original decision.

e) Penalties

Any person who violates any provisions of this ASA Plan is guilty of a violation. Failure from day-to-day to comply with the terms of this ASA Plan shall be a separate offense for each such day. Failure to comply with any provision of the Plan shall be a separate offense for each such provision.

Violations of the provisions of this ASA Plan may be punishable, upon conviction, by a fine of not more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) per day per violation.

6. Coordination

(1) The Ambulance Service Advisory Committee will review the ASA plan and propose changes when requested or required by agencies or at the direction of the Gilliam County Court.

(2) Complaint Review Process.

Complaints regarding violation of this ASA Plan shall be submitted in writing to the Gilliam County Court. The Gilliam County Court shall then forward the complaint to the ASA Committee for their review and recommendations or changes on such complaints or questions. The ASA Committee shall also resolve any problems involving system operations (i.e., changing policies and procedures to address recurring problems, etc.).

Ongoing input may be provided by consumers, providers or the medical community to any member of the Gilliam County Court. This individual, in turn, will present the complaint, concern, idea or suggestion in writing to the full Gilliam County Court for consideration.

(3) Mutual Aid Agreements

Each ambulance service provider shall sign a mutual aid agreement with the other providers in the County and with other providers in adjoining counties to respond with needed personnel and equipment in accordance with the agreement.

All requests for mutual aid shall be made through the appropriate PSAP.

All mutual aid agreements will be reviewed and modified as needed by mutual consent of all parties.

Gilliam County Emergency Management will maintain copies of all Mutual Aid Agreements for each Ambulance Service in Gilliam County. Office is located in the Gilliam County Courthouse, 221 S. Oregon Street, Condon, OR 97823. 541-351-9530

(4) Disaster Response

(a) County Resources other than Ambulances

As a minimal goal at the present time, ambulance providers are expected to examine any given situation in terms of its potential or actual magnitude of disaster and summon any appropriate additional resources that may be available. Specialized rescue units, air ambulance and any other unit deemed necessary by a given situation will be summoned when appropriate. At this time, Gilliam County Sheriff's Office is a non-transporting EMS provider in the County.

(b) Out of County(ies) Resources - See Resources Attachment #3

(c) Mass Casualty Incident Plan - Gilliam County has an MCI Plan through ATAB 6, which was revised September, 2022. An electronic copy of the plan is located at the Gilliam County Emergency Management Office, 221 S. Oregon St, Condon, OR 97823 – 541-351-9530. See Attachment # 4.

(d) Personnel and Equipment Resources

(1) Hazardous Materials – Gilliam County has access to Hermiston Haz Mat team, accessed through the Oregon Emergency Response System (OERS) at 1-800-452-0311

(2) Search and Rescue – Gilliam County Search and Rescue is under the Gilliam County Sheriff's Office. Gilliam County does not have an active rescue unit; therefore Gilliam County Sheriff's Office utilizes the North and South Fire District volunteers when needed. If a rescue mission is initiated, Gilliam County Sheriff's Office will contact OERS at 1-800-452-0311 for an incident number.

(3) Specialized Rescue – There is no specialized rescue provided in Gilliam County. Gilliam County Sheriff's Office will utilize contacts through Oregon State Sheriffs Association mutual aid agreements across the state to access specialized rescue resources.

(4) Extrication – Gilliam County Fire agencies have equipment and capabilities for vehicle extrication.

(e) Emergency Communication and System Access

(1) The Frontier Regional 911 Center is located in Condon, Oregon and is the Public Safety Answering Point. and receives all emergency service requests in Gilliam County. Persons will have access to the Frontier Regional 911 Center by calling 9-1-1. Upon receipt of a request emergency service providers in Gilliam County are dispatched by Frontier Regional 911.

(2) Dispatch Procedures –

a. The appropriate personnel shall be notified by the dispatcher via radio, pagers and/or other devices within four (4) minutes of receipt of an EMS call.

- b. The dispatcher will obtain from the caller, if possible, and relay to the first responders the following:
 - 1. Location of the incident;
 - 2. Nature of the incident; and
 - 3. Any specific instructions or information pertinent to the incident.

- c. Communication to the Dispatch by Radio from EMS personnel includes any of the following:
 - 1. Page acknowledged
 - 2. Enroute to scene or destination and type of response
 - 3. Arrival on scene or destination
 - 4. Extended on scene
 - 5. Transporting patient(s) to hospital or medical facility, the number of patients, and name of facility
 - 6. Arrival at receiving facility
 - 7. Back in service
 - 8. Back in quarters

- d. Ambulance personnel shall inform the receiving hospital of the following information:
 - 1. Agency/Unit identification
 - 2. Age and sex of each patient
 - 3. Condition and chief complaint of each patient
 - 4. Vital signs of each patient
 - 5. Treatment rendered
 - 6. Estimated time of arrival

(3) Radio System - All ambulances in Gilliam County shall be equipped to communicate on the following frequencies:

Dispatch: 700 Radio System; 920 (Condon); 921 (Arlington)

HEAR

Gilliam County Sheriff: 700 Radio System; 590 (Condon); 591 (Arlington)

After the initial dispatch, they will have continuous communications with Frontier Regional 911 and the receiving medical facility as communication conditions allow.

(4) Emergency Medical Services Dispatcher Training

Gilliam County 9-1-1 dispatch is handled by Frontier Regional 911 which have established guidelines for training their dispatchers in accordance with current regulations of the State of Oregon.

7. Provider Selection

(1) Initial Assignment

Any person wishing to provide ambulance services within said county shall submit a letter of intent to bid within thirty (30) days of the announcement regarding the opening of an Ambulance Service Area (ASA). All bid proposals shall be submitted to and reviewed by the Gilliam County Court. Assignment of all ASA's shall be made by the Gilliam County Court. Assignment of an ASA shall be valid until revised or revoked by the Gilliam County Court.

(2) Application for an ASA

In the event an ambulance assigned area becomes vacant or in danger of becoming vacant, an application for ASA will be developed.

(3) Notification of Vacating an ASA

The provider shall not voluntarily discontinue service to the assigned Ambulance Service Area without giving ninety (90) days written notice to the Gilliam County Court. The provider shall not transfer, sell, or exchange the assignment of an Ambulance Service Area or any part thereof. The assignment of the ASA is to provide service to that area and if the provider is unable or unwilling to continue to provide such service, a written notice to the Gilliam County Court for vacating an ASA must be made and the provider must comply with the terms for vacating an ASA under this plan.

(4) Maintenance of Level of Service

As a safety net for the unexpected temporary discontinuance of service, mutual aid is available to maintain a minimum level of service.

(5) In the event an ambulance service is unable to fulfill its obligations, Gilliam County Court will reassign the ASA to another ambulance service provider. The process used will be the provider selection criteria referenced above.

8. County Ordinances and Rules

The Gilliam County Court shall adopt an Ambulance Service Area Ordinance. The Ordinance shall include criteria for administering the Gilliam County Ambulance Service Area Plan; limiting ambulance services that may operate in the county; establishing an application process; ambulance franchise terms; enforcement; preventing interruption of service; appeals, abatement and penalties; duties of the franchisee; and establishing membership and duties of the advisory committee.

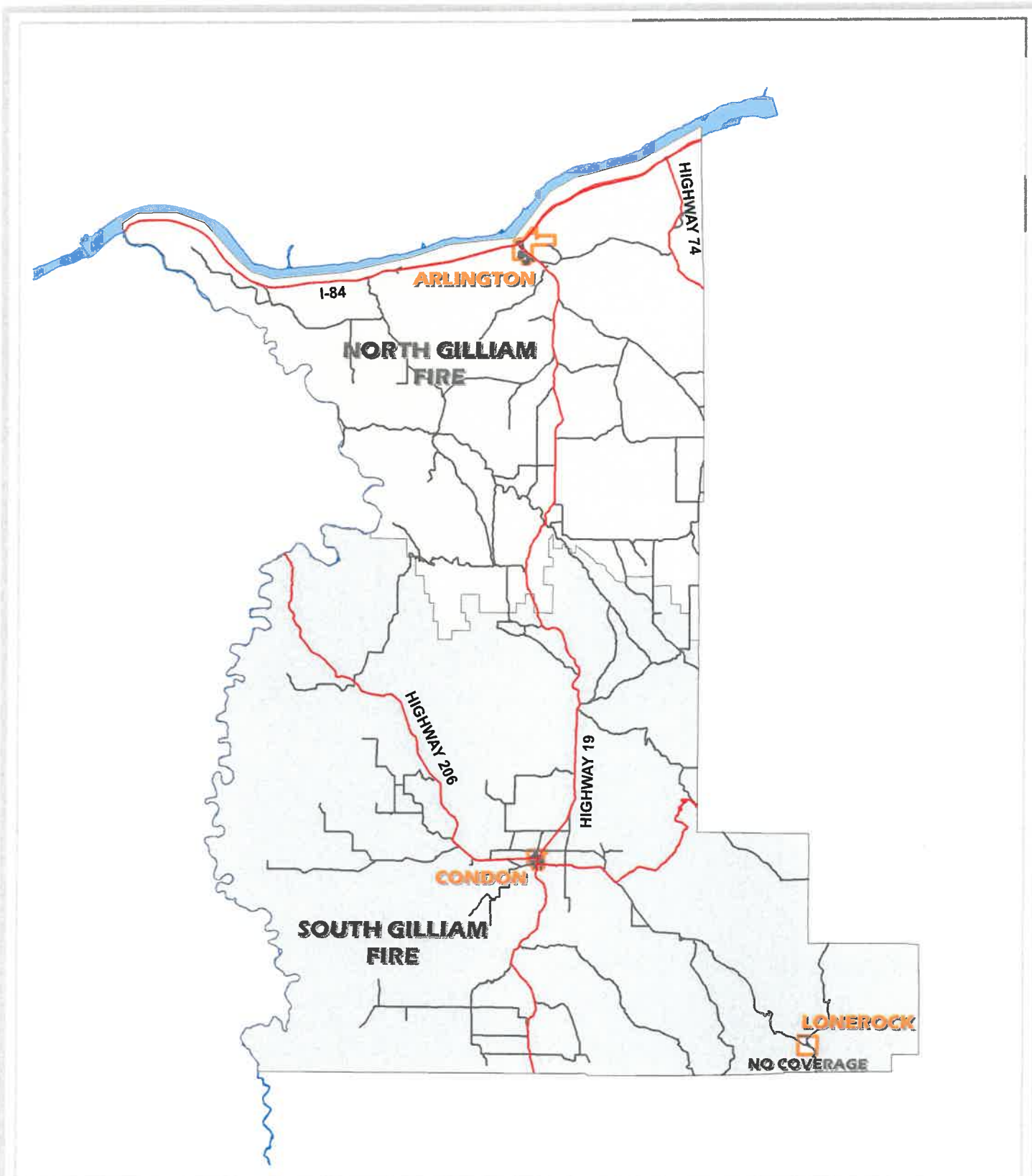

MAP FOR FIRE DISTRICT BOUNDARIES

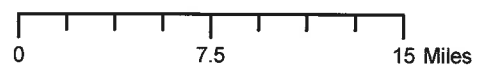

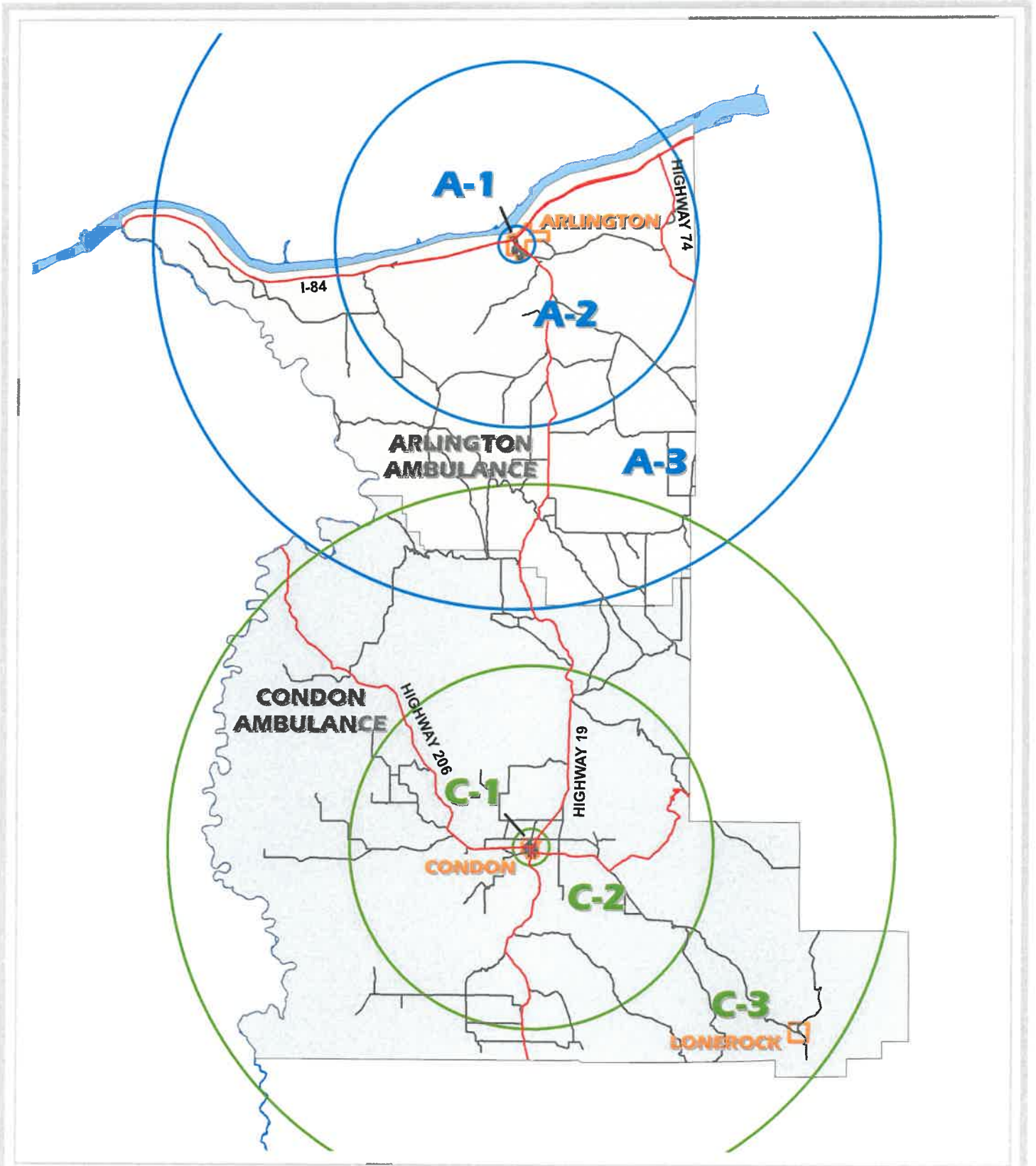
